1	Module 1: Introduction to the Evidence Analysis Library	Welcome to the Evidence Analysis Library Orientation Tutorial. The tutorial is a series of 4 modules. Each modules is approximately 10-15 minutes in length. You can stop at any time and return the presentation.
2	About the EAL Orientation Tutorial	The goals of the Evidence Analysis Library Tutorial are to learn about the EAL; highlight the features of the site; provide tips on to access the summarized research, provide tips to navigate the site; review the Academy’s evidence analysis process; review the Academy’s guideline development process; learn about EAL resources designed to help implement the guidelines.
3	CPE Information	Upon completion of all 4 modules you will be given instructions to access a short quiz on the modules. A passing grade of 80% will result in a certificate with 1 CPE unit.
4	Module 1: Introduction to the Evidence Analysis Library and Tips on Navigating the Site	Let’s begin with Module 1 - Introduction to the Evidence Analysis Library and Tips on Navigating the Site.
5	Module 1 Objectives	Upon completion of this module, you will know how to log into the EAL and access the summarized research; navigate the site; locate and access the projects and research; use the search engine and the A through Z index; use the print tool; locate the frequently asked questions section; and learn how to contact the EAL staff
6	About the EAL	The Evidence Analysis Library, or the EAL, was launched in 2004. The EAL is an online, user-friendly site that provides a summary of the best available research on various nutrition topics. The EAL is a series of systematic reviews developed by the Academy, based on a pre-

		define approach and criteria. An objective and transparent methodology to assess food and related science. The EAL is free to members of the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics. One-month trial and annual subscriptions are available for individuals; group subscriptions are available for college/university libraries, hospitals, medical libraries, dietetic associations, and allied organizations.
7	How Academy Members can Access the EAL	Members of the Academy can access the EAL 1 of 2 ways – though the Academy’s website www.eatrightpro.org or direct to the EAL at www.andeal.org . Both require the same login information.
8	Via www.eatrightpro.org	Members can log into the EAL through the Academy’s website. First, go to www.eatrightpro.org . Next, login using your Academy username and password. Mouse over the Research tab and select Evidence Analysis Library. Click on the words ‘Evidence Analysis Library’ and you will be redirected to the EAL.
9	Via www.andeal.org	Academy members can go directly to the EAL. Use the same login information that you use to log into eatrightpro.org. Go to www.andeal.org . Next, click on the word Login located in the upper right hand corner. Enter your Academy username and password.
10	Not an Academy member?	Not a member of the Academy? Not a problem. You can purchase full access to the EAL. A one-time/one-month trial subscription or an annual subscription to the EAL are available. From the login scree, click on the link to purchase a subscription.
11	The Home Page	Next let’s learn how to navigate the site. The home page of the EAL is divided into 3 sections. A horizontal toolbar is located at the top. The middle section is a series of links to facilitate access to popular pages. And the bottom section are 4 pods with links to various resources. It is a long home page so be sure to scroll down so you don’t miss any of the features.
12	1. Navigation	The top navigation bar has five main categories or tabs which include Projects, Policy and

		Process, Resources, Index and About. Using your mouse, hover over the titles to see topics under each category. In this example, the Resources has 6 sub categories.
13	2. Quick Links	The middle section has 3 pods. Use these links to learn why evidence-based practice is important; how you can get involved with the EAL; and quickly access popular pages like glossary of EAL terminology and study designs, information on the nutrition process and much more.
14	3. Additional Links	Scroll all the way down to the bottom section for additional information and resources. Non-members can subscribe to the EAL. If you don't already have NutriGuides mobile app, you will definitely want to click on the link to learn more this great resource.
15	Going Home	The top navigation is always visible from every page on the site. Click on the home icon to get o the EAL home page. Use the back arrow to navigate throughout the site.
16	Responsive Screen	The EAL has a responsive screen which means that your view will adjust based on the device you are using – whether you are on a computer, tablet or smart phone. The look will change but you can still access all of the content.
17	Projects	Let's start with the Projects tab. This is where you will locate the summarized research. Mouse over this tab to view a listing of all of the active projects. Projects are listed in alphabetical order. Use your mouse to select a topic. Mouse over the projects tab at any time to select another topic.
18	Project Home Page	Each project topic has its own landing page. The highlighted section includes a brief overview on the topic. Click on the sub-section title to expand the section and view the content. In this example, the project team subsection is expanded. The project team is a listing of all of the individuals who contributed their time and expertise to the project. It includes information on funding of the project as well as any conflict of interest disclosures from the workgroup. Click the title again to collapse the section.

19	Left Navigation Bar	The highlighted section is the left navigation bar. It includes links to all of content of this project. It includes the systematic review as well as the guideline material. The most current information is located at the top. Please note that not all systematic reviews continue onto the guideline phase.
20	NCP Categories	All of the evidence analysis questions are organized by nutrition care process categories. The categories include assessment, diagnosis, intervention, and monitoring & evaluation. Questions that fall outside of the NCP are in a category titled Basic Research. Click on the title to expand the category and view the questions under that category.
21	Screen shot	In this example, the Intervention category was expanded to view 2 questions. Note that all of the content – conclusion, evidence summary and search plan are all easily accessible. Also note that the left navigation bar is always available so that you can jump through the topic.
22	ES screen shot	The EAL is designed to minimize drilling down or jumping from page to page. Users can click the title or plus sign to expand a section. Click the minus sign to close a subsection.
23	Policy and Process	The policy and process section was formerly the methodology tab. It includes tabs to the Academy’s meticulous evidence analysis process and the guideline development process. Modules 2 and 3 will cover these processes in greater detail. You can download a free copy of the Evidence Analysis Manual in PDF format as well as worksheet templates from this section.
24	Resources	The Resources tab includes free resources like PowerPoint presentations on the EAL process, evidence-based practice and nutrition care process. Topics will change so you will want to visit this section periodically for new topics and resources.
25	Index	In addition to using your mouse to view the project listing, you can click on the Index tab to find EAL content.

26	Search Results	Here is an example of results when using the search engine. In this example, the words 'heart failure' were entered. Search results are separated by question, evidence summaries, worksheets, recommendations and topics.
27	About	The About tab includes information on the Evidence Analysis Library. It also includes information on how to cite content from the EAL and on how to request permission to reprint content from the EAL. The frequently asked questions answers some of the most common questions from users.
28	Tools	The following tools are available on each page of the EAL. Use these tools to bookmark a page; and a page to your print queue; create a note; increase and decrease the font size; and view a page as a PDF.
29	Example of Bookmark and Print Queue Tools	Here is an example of 2 bookmarks. Use this tool to track your favorite pages. Note that bookmarks can be from different projects. This example includes a bookmark from the celiac disease project and the bariatric surgery project. Click on the 'X' next to each bookmark to remove the bookmark from the list. Next is an example of a page added to the print queue. You can add several pages as you go through the site. Click on the words 'download queue' to print all of the pages at one time in a printer-friendly format. To delete a page from the print queue, simply click the 'x' next to the title.
30	Example of Notes Tool	Here is an example of the Notes tool. When you click on the Notes icon in the toolbar, a box will pop up. Give it a title. In this example, I named it Test Note. Insert your comments and click Add Note. It will be saved under My Notes on the page. Click to expand and view. When you are done, click the red delete button to remove it. This tool will help you personalize the EAL with information that is relevant to your work.
31	Printing Guideline Information	To print the entire guideline at one time, click on the guideline title link in the left navigation bar. On the landing page, click on the links to download a PDF of the guideline material.

32	Help	Click on the word Help in the upper right hand corner for assistance with the website.
33	Contact Us	Click on the word Contact Us to email the EAL staff if you experience a problem with the site, to suggest a topic for the EAL, or for assistance.
